Dear Secretary Thompson:

I am writing in support of the Ryan White CARE Act Title I grant application for the New York Eligible Metropolitan Area (EMA) for FY 2005. While I understand the fiscal year 2005 federal appropriation for Title I of the Ryan White CARE Act is expected to be level funded, I respectfully request that the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) provide the New York EMA with \$134,084,917 in vital Title I funding – the full amount requested in the grant application.

As a person living with HIV/AIDS, I personally know how vitally needed these services are. The New York EMA's Ryan White Title I award supports a whole host of vitally needed services that are the lifeblood for thousands of persons living with HIV/AIDS, including enhancing the AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP), primary medical care, emergency rental assistance, mental health and substance abuse counseling, and case management, to name a few. Without these services, countless PLWHAs would be without medication, food and shelter, and other supports.


New York City remains the epicenter of the HIV/AIDS epidemic nationally, with almost 89,000 New Yorkers diagnosed and known to be living with HIV, including 57,316 diagnosed with AIDS and at least an estimated 25,000 additional people living with HIV but not yet diagnosed. In 2003 alone the number of reported new HIV/AIDS cases was 4,086, which surpasses the total number of people living with AIDS in many U.S. cities.


In addition, New Yorkers living with HIV and AIDS have a high percentage of co-morbidities (such as serious mental health problems, intravenous drug use, and other sexually transmitted diseases) and persons in extreme poverty that are concentrated in traditionally marginalized populations. Among people living with HIV/AIDS, 73% of the recently diagnosed have incomes under \$10,000 annually, 77% are minority, and fewer than 10% have private health insurance.

I share with you an understanding of the difficulties placed on the Department of Health and Human Services and the Health Resources and Services Administration by flat funding of Title I of the Ryan White CARE Act. Meanwhile, the Centers for Disease Control initiative "Advancing HIV Prevention: New Strategies for a Changing Epidemic," launched in April 2003, will significantly increase the demand for HIV-related care and services in communities across our country and within the New York EMA. This initiative to help HIV-infected individuals learn their status is untenable without providing the resources that will allow them to access care and treatment that can improve and lengthen their lives.

Therefore, on behalf of the New York EMA, I am requesting that you through the Health Resources and Services Administration provide the New York EMA with \$134,084,917 in essential Title I funding. The lives of people living with HIV/AIDS in New York depend on it.
